

- Organized a food drive on campus (currently ongoing) for Pohukaina Food Pantry




University of Hawai'i at Mānoa


What is it? when the body's immune system attacks the protective covering of nerves (myelin sheath) resulting in scars and blocking the communication between the brain and the body



Cause. unknown, but a combination of genetics and environments factors can be responsible

Symptoms. loss of vision, numbness in the legs, spasms, fatigue, depression, walking difficulties





MARCH AWARENESS



Developmental disabilities are characterized by deficiencies in the domains of movement, cognition, language, and behavior. These include:

- Autism spectrum disorders
- Cerebral Palsy
- ADHD/Hyperactivity disorder
- Learning/intellectual disorder
- Hearing loss
- Vision Impairment



Important Facts about Developmental Disabilities

When does it begin?

The majority of developmental problems start before birth, but some can occur afterward due to trauma, infection, or other circumstances

It educates the community

It is beneficial to inform our community that developmental problems are not always obvious.

What Causes It?

- Genetics
- maternal Health
- Behaviors (Smoking and drinking during pregnancy)
- birth complications
- infections
- exposure to high levels of environmental toxins

It fosters peer relationships
