

CERVICAL CANCER

Definition: Cancer that originates in the cervix of the female reproductive system

Almost all cervical cancers are caused by the humanpapilloma (HPV) virus

The HPV virus is easily transmitted through sexual skin to skin contact

HOW CAN I REDUCE MY RISK OF CERVICAL CANCER?

Screening Tests

- Pan Smear: checks for precancerous cells
- HPV test: checks for presence of HPV virus

HPV Vaccine

- Recommended for preteens and through age 26 years
 - -Prevents new HPV infections, but does not treat
 existing infections or diseases
- -Works best when given before any exposure to HPV


