

Thursday's Plenary Examined the Value of Nurses as Leaders of Interprofessional Care



Appropriate to a session on interprofessional care, Plenary Speaker, **Elizabeth Speakman**, EdD, RN, was introduced by moderator and pharmacy student **Felix Tran**, BS, president of the Student National Pharmaceutical Association (SNPhA). Mr. Tran encouraged attendees to "collaborate to connect."

In Thursday's Plenary Session—titled, Interdisciplinary Patient-Centered Care: RNs Rally the Team—Dr. Speakman urged nurses and nursing students to "step up, dialogue, and comingle with other professionals to provide quality care." She stressed the importance of teamwork, explaining that "the collective vision of the whole is more powerful than the vision of the individual; we cannot do silo care management."

She highlighted Institute of Medicine (IOM) reports that have recommended interdisciplinary care—now called interprofessional care—as the best way to reduce errors and improve patient care:

- To Err is Human: Building A Safer Health System, 1999
- Crossing the Quality Chasm: A New Health System for the 21st Century, 2001
- Health Professions Education: A Bridge to Quality, 2003
- The Future of Nursing: Leading Change, Advancing Health, 2010
- Interprofessional Education for Collaboration: Learning How to Improve Health from Interprofessional Models Across the Continuum of Education to Practice, 2013

Dr. Speakman reported that the trend to interprofessional education is designed to increase interprofessional practice. In her multimedia presentation, Dr. Speakman integrated videos to demonstrate the importance of teamwork in a variety of settings. She pointed out that "a team of experts does not mean an expert team." She described nurses as the natural leaders of the healthcare team.

"Nurses need to rally the team," suggested Dr. Speakman. "Nurses are the cheerleaders, the people who can move the team forward because nurses are central to all care. Because patients tell nurses things they may not tell others, you will know more about the patient and need to share as you interact with other providers. The buck stops with you: When something doesn't look right, feel right, you need to speak up."

She concluded by pointing out that, "Teams that work well together and have higher levels of participation are more effective in delivering high quality care."

Career Development Center *The Exhibit Hall and Career Development Center continue today, 9am - 12pm in Ryman Hall C2*

NSNA members had the chance to greet vendors and colleges of nursing representatives during their visits to the Exhibit Hall, which opened Wednesday. The Career Development Center was a great draw — students were advised by nursing faculty mentors and seasoned nursing administrators who gave valuable feedback on resumés, career goals, and other documentation. Students also learned how to best highlight their accomplishments and make themselves stand out in the job-hunting process.

Friday Plenary Panel Focuses on Nursing Leadership for Patient Safety

In a panel discussion moderated by **Gloria Donnelly**, PhD, RN, Dean of Dexel University College of Nursing and Health Professions, five nurse leaders addressed the critical role nurses play in protecting patients from adverse events while receiving health care. The panel consisted of **Maureen "Shawn" Kennedy**, MA, RN, Editor-in-Chief, AJN; **Cheryl Taylor**, PhD, RN, NLN-Appointed Consultant; **Rebecca M. Patton**, MSN, RN, ANA-Appointed Consultant; **Deena Brecher**, MSN, RN, APN, President, Emergency Nurses Association; and **Margaret Barton-Burke**, PhD, RN, President-Elect, Oncology Nursing Society

Patient safety is an issue all the time, and nurses are the forefront," said Dr. Donnelly who noted that 65% of adverse events are preventable.

Ms. Kennedy set the stage for the panel discussion by noting the shift from a punitive individual approach to errors to the current trend of looking at ways to structure the work environment to reduce error. She cautioned however that nurses who work long hours are prone to make errors. She suggested attendees look up the case of Julie Thao, RN, a dedicated, compassionate nurse who was criminally charged for a medication error that she made after agreeing to work long hours.

Dr. Taylor urged applying love, courage, and honor: "Recognize and admit errors in patient care settings. Don't pass the buck; when an error is identified, be honest and work together with all disciples to fix it. Remember that a mental status assessment of a patient is as important as a physical assessment in preventing injuries." She suggested learning more about nurses' roles in patient safety from the Nurses Service Organization (NSO), which collects data on malpractice. In conclusion, she urged attendees to review Imprint's February/March 2014 special issue, "Use Your Voice: Ethics in Nursing."

Ms. Patton examined how faculty can use the clinical environment to teach patient safety. She noted that rotating students through the OR helped them learn communication, advocacy, safety, teamwork, evidenced-based quality care, and patient centered-care.

Delegates Added 3 Candidates to Slate. Adopted 27 Resolutions at Friday House

The House reconvened on Friday morning, delegates added 3 candidates for the office of BTN Director to the slate:

BTN Director: Jonathan Cox, Louisiana; Kara Heatter, Illinois; Paige Weikle, South Carolina

Before using the voting boxes to act on proposed resolution, delegates responded to questions to test them:

- Do you have a smart phone? 97% yes; 3% no
- Is this your 1st NSNA Convention? 79% yes; 21% no
- How many MidYear conventions have you been to? 73% 1; 15% 2; 7% 3; 4% 4
- How long was your trip here? 1% less than 1 hr; 33% 1-4 hours; 57% 5-12 hours; 9% more than 12 hours

Of the 30 proposed resolutions discussed in the Thursday Resolutions Hearing, t he Friday House adopted 26 without changes and one with changes, Resolution 7. The House resumes today at 9:45am to vote on the remaining resolutions and to conclude its business. Look online at **nsnaconvetion.org** for a full list of resolutions.
